In the spirit of inclusion we offer both a "teleloop" system and infrared headsets for those who are hard of hearing. To access the signal, switch your own hearing aid to the "T" position. Headsets are available by the doors from the beadles (ushers).

VISION 2020 -- BOLDLY ENGAGING IN OUR FUTURE

The Vision 2020 Steering Committee is continuing to move forward with the critical next steps toward our capital campaign project of renovating and expanding the Parish Hall. In addition to selecting Bonstra | Haresign Architects to design the final plans, we have also hired E&G Group to be our "owner's representative" and project manager. E&G Group is based in McLean, Virginia, but our primary consultant, Alex Berley, is a Capitol Hill resident. Alex and his E&G colleagues have particular expertise in helping non-profit organizations manage complicated projects and seeing them to an on-budget, on-schedule completion. They will help us negotiate virtually every aspect of the project from signing the contract with the architect, to securing the necessary permits, to helping us manage contractors, all the way through to when we open the doors to our new space in (hopefully!) 2012. In the coming months, our consultants will be re-evaluating our space, beginning discussions with the city and the various boards that need to sign off on our project, and producing more detailed plans for renovation of the Parish Hall. Our goal remains to begin fundraising this fall, with construction to start in 2012. We will continue to keep the community informed as we begin this next phase of the project.
