We formally begin the worship service with the Prelude, a musical offering designed to bring us together for worship that allows for quiet reflection before the service begins. Please respect this time by refraining from conversations in the Nave as much as possible. THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

The Feast of the Epiphany celebrates the arrival of the wise men from the East—representing the reach of the Good News of Jesus to the Gentile nations. Throughout the season of Epiphany, we will celebrate and reflect on this spreading of God’s message of love.

Jesus the child manifests that love here today.

COLLECT

God be with you.
And also with you.

Let us pray:

Provoking God, calling us through the face of the Other: free our fickle hearts from our need to divide and exclude the foreign and the misfit; help us go through the storms of rage to a clear and new beginning; through Jesus Christ, whom hatred cannot touch. Amen.

THE FIRST READING 1 Corinthians 13:1-13

If I speak in the tongues of mortals and of angels, but do not have love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal. And if I have prophetic powers, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have all faith, so as to remove mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing. If I give away all my possessions, and if I hand over my body so that I may boast, but do not have love, I gain nothing.

Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never ends. But as for prophecies, they will come to an end; as for tongues, they will cease; as for knowledge, it will come to an end. For we know only in part, and we prophesy only in part; but when the complete comes, the partial will come to an end. When I was a child, I spoke like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child; when I became an adult, I put an end to childish ways. For now we see in a mirror, dimly, but then we will see face to face. Now I know only in part; then I will know fully, even as I have been fully known. And now faith, hope, and love abide, these three; and the greatest of these is love.

Hear what the Spirit is saying to us.
Thanks be to God.

The people stand as able.

THE GOSPEL Luke 4:21-30

The Gospel of Jesus according to Luke.

Glory to you, Lord Christ.

In the synagogue at Nazareth, Jesus read from the book of the prophet Isaiah, and began to say, "Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing." All spoke well of him and were amazed at the gracious words that came from his mouth. They said, "Is not this Joseph's son?" He said to them, "Doubtless you will quote to me this proverb, 'Doctor, cure yourself!' And you will say, 'Do here also in your hometown the things that we have heard you did at Capernaum.'" And he said, "Truly I tell you, no prophet is accepted in the prophet's hometown. But the truth is, there were many widows in Israel in the time of Elijah, when the heaven was shut up three years and six months, and there was a severe famine over all the land; yet Elijah was sent to none of them except to a widow at Zarephath in Sidon. There were also many lepers in Israel in the time of the prophet Elisha, and none of them was cleansed except Naaman the Syrian." When they heard this, all in the synagogue were filled with rage. They got up, drove him out of the town, and led him to the brow of the hill on which their town was built, so that they might hurl him off the cliff. But he passed through the midst of them and went on his way.

THE LITURGY OF THE TABLE

EUCCHARISTIC PRAYER

God is always with us.

The Spirit is moving among us!

Lift up your hearts.

We lift them up to the Incarnate One.

Let us give thanks to God.

It is right to give our thanks and praise.

Worship and praise belong to you, Creator, in every place and at all times. All power is yours. You are without beginning and without end. You called into being all that is; you created the heavens and established the earth, giving life to all.

Through your Son Jesus Christ our life and yours are brought together in a wonderful exchange: divinity is bound to human nature and humanity taken up to God.

Through your Holy Spirit, you call all humankind to new birth in a creation restored by love. As children of your redeeming purpose we offer you our praise.

Therefore with Angels and Archangels and with the whole company of heaven, we proclaim the hymn of your unending glory:

Holy, holy, holy Lord; God of power and might! Heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest!

Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord; hosanna in the highest!

Glory and thanksgiving be to you, most loving Creator, for the gift of your Son born in human flesh. He is the Word existing beyond time, both source and final purpose, bringing to wholeness all that is made and manifesting your love for us.

We thank you that through him you have freed us from our sin: that though he died upon the cross, he has risen again for us.

We give you thanks, because in taking our nature upon him, he manifested the radiance of your glory, and brought us out of darkness into his marvelous light.

On the night before he died, he took bread and gave you thanks. He broke the bread, gave it to his disciples and said:

“Take, eat. This is my Body: it is broken for you.”

After supper, he took the cup; he offered you thanks, he gave it to them and said:

“Drink this, all of you. This is my Blood of the new covenant: it is poured out for you and for all people, that sins may be forgiven. Do this in remembrance of me.”

And so now:

We recall his blessed passion and death, his glorious resurrection and ascension, and we look for the coming of his kingdom. United with him, we offer you these gifts and ourselves with them; one, holy, and living sacrifice.

Hear us, most merciful Creator, and send your Holy Spirit upon us and upon this bread and this wine, that, manifesting Jesus’s life-giving power, they may be the Body and Blood of your Son, and we may be kindled with the fire of your love and renewed for the service of your kingdom.

Help us who are bound into the fellowship of your whole Church to live and work to your praise and glory:

May we grow together in unity and love until at last in a renewed creation we share the life of the Saints, in the company of all Apostles and Prophets, and of all our siblings living and departed.

Accept our offering through Jesus Christ our Lord, through whom, with whom and in whom, all honor and glory be to you, God of all Ages, world without end.

AMEN!

During the season of Epiphany, we will be using the traditional version of the Lord’s Prayer.

The deep roots of our Christian tradition offer us a path to grow more deeply with Jesus Christ at the center of our lives so that we can bear witness to his way of love in and for the world. For centuries, monastic communities have shaped their lives around rhythms and disciplines for following Jesus together. Such a pattern is known as a “Rule of Life.” *The Way of Love: Practices for Jesus-Centered Life* was developed by our Presiding Bishop, the Most Reverend Michael Curry, to outline a Rule for the Episcopal branch of the Jesus Movement. Throughout the season of Epiphany, the Reverends Michele Morgan, Scott Lipscomb, and Patricia Catalano will lead a preaching series reflecting on Bishop Curry’s proposed rule to ask how we can apply Jesus’s wisdom to our lives today.
