The Missa Gaia or "Earth Mass" was commissioned by the Very Reverend James Parks Morton, Dean of the Cathedral of St. John The Divine in New York City, to be a contemporary, ecumenical Mass setting. Soprano saxophonist Paul Winter, an artist-in-residence at the Cathedral, decided to use the sounds of several animals for inspiration to create his mass setting.

A recording of the howl of a female Alaskan tundra wolf gave him the initial four-note motive for the Kyrie. Fellow composer Paul Halley then created a choral composition from this music, also incorporating West African rhythms. A humpback whale song inspired the initial motive for this piece, which was then added to by Brazilian guitarist Oscar Castro-Nueves and Paul Halley. The Agnus Dei was adapted from a song that the Paul Winter Consort had already recorded, a ballad for the harp seals. This movement of the piece incorporates the sounds of harp seal pups. Winter chose the words of St. Francis, the patron saint of animals and the environment, to form the basis of The Canticle of Brother Sun, the first and last movements of the Earth Mass. The resulting combination of music is an eclectic and multi-cultural choral work that fuses elements of jazz and gospel, African and Brazilian music, and Gregorian chant.

Missa Gaia/Earth Mass was premiered at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine, New York City, on May 10, 1981. Since then, the Mass has been performed at the Cathedral each year on the first Sunday of October, the feast day of St. Francis of Assisi.


SECOND READING Exodus 17:1-7

From the wilderness of Sin the whole congregation of the Israelites journeyed by stages, as the Lord commanded. They camped at Rephidim, but there was no water for the people to drink. The people quarreled with Moses, and said, "Give us water to drink." Moses said to them, "Why do you quarrel with me? Why do you test the Lord?" But the people thirsted there for water; and the people complained against Moses and said, "Why did you bring us out of Egypt, to kill us and our children and livestock with thirst?" So Moses cried out to the Lord, "What shall I do with this people? They are almost ready to stone me." 


