## 4. Take Action to Support Migrant Ministry under Threat

The Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton is suing Annunciation House in El Paso, a network of migrant shelters that has been in operation for almost 50 years, and aims to shut it down.

Paxton's legal action appears to be part of a broader Republican push to target Catholic nonprofits serving migrants at the border amid an effort to make immigration a key 2024 election campaign issue.

#### 7. Gun Violence Strikes One of Our Own.

As you all know, St. Mark's has hosted the Newtown Vigil for All Survivors of Gun Violence for the last nine years, extending supporting and hospitality for all who gather. Now, one of our own needs that support. The brother of Victor Aldana, who is the key member of our custodial team, was shot by a 16 year old and is in critical condition at MedStar Washington Hospital Center. The outlook is uncertain. Victor told us that when he was helping during the vigil, he never thought this would happen to his family. Rep. Jamie Raskin's office is helping make arrangements for his mother to travel from El Salvador. Victor's brother is the primary support of his family. There is a GoFundMe campaign to help his brother and family. Even if he makes a full recovery, there will be many expenses associated with this tragedy so we are urging St. Mark's to give generously.
