The Arms of St. Marks, walnut, burled maple, copper, 44 x 44 x 10 inches The sculpture called The Arms of St. Marks was made by sculptor Lynda Smith-Bugge in response to the support her family received during a family crisis. The vertical post of the cross is split open, creating a triangle, a powerful symbol of the Trinity and the holy. The copper tubing represents the arms of the community holding up the horizontal arm of the cross. The family that sits on top of this arm are represented in the small spheres.
