Hearing – Infrared headsets providing amplified sound are in the tract racks by the doors, or ask an usher. St. Mark's is also equipped with a hearing loop. This allows many hearing aid wearers to use their hearing aids' telecoil, or *T-coil*, setting to transmit speech picked up by the microphones directly to their aids. Enabling this setting on your hearing aids may make it easier to hear and understand people using wireless mics or speaking at the podiums.



Restrooms are available in the foyer, with more downstairs.

Childcare – The Nursery is open until 12:30 PM. Children up to PreK-3 are welcome. Take the stairs to the lower level; turn right to go down the hall to the Nursery, the last room on your right.

Land Acknowledgment – We acknowledge with respect the history, spirituality, and culture of the peoples on whose traditional territory we are located, specifically the Piscataway and Nacotchtank (Anacostan) peoples. We make this acknowledgment mindful of the traumatic events and the ongoing forces of systemic racism and oppression that forced native peoples from their lands. We continue our commitment to learning, growing, and finding a new way forward for meaningful, mutual healing.



Today's Guest Organist Dr. Paula Maust is a performer, scholar, and educator dedicated to amplifying underrepresented voices. An early music specialist, she performs extensively as an organist and harpsichordist across the region with the Washington Bach Consort, Folger Consort, and In Series Opera. Paula also co-directs Musica Spira, a baroque chamber ensemble that tells the stories of early modern musical women. Their debut album of repertoire by Isabella Leonarda and Maria Perucona will be released this year. Paula is the creator of Expanding the Music Theory Canon, a collection of more than 500 musical examples by historical women and/or people of color. An anthology based on the project was released by SUNY Press in 2024. She is an Assistant Professor of Music Theory at the Peabody Conservatory of the Johns Hopkins University.

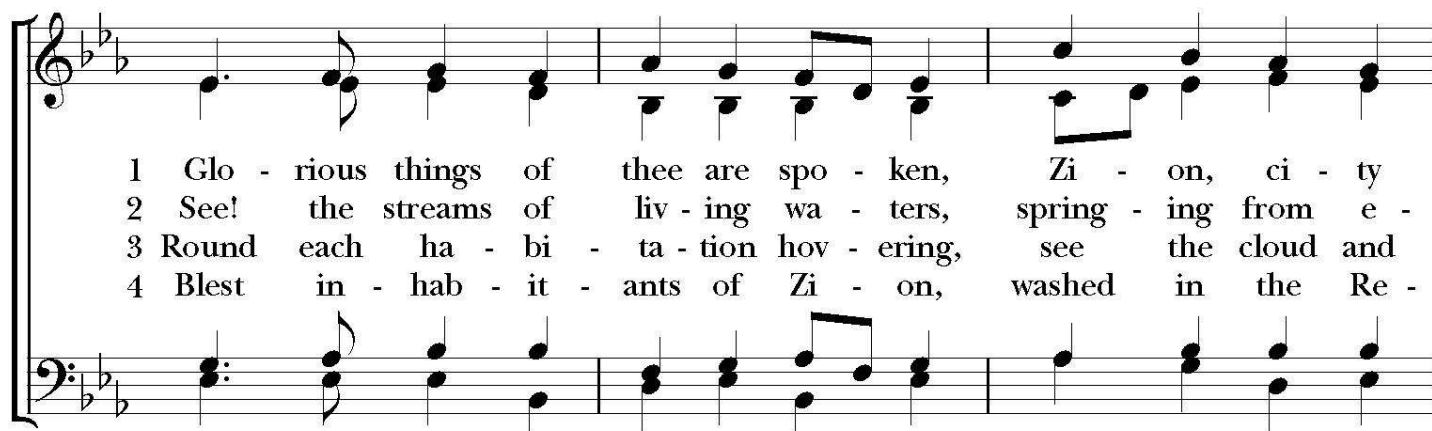

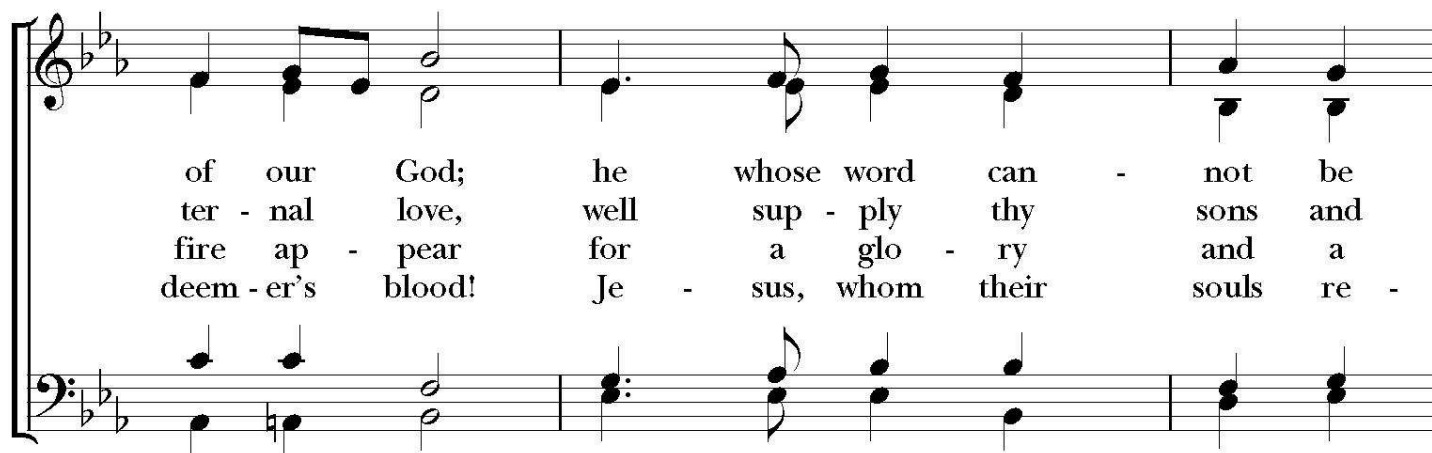

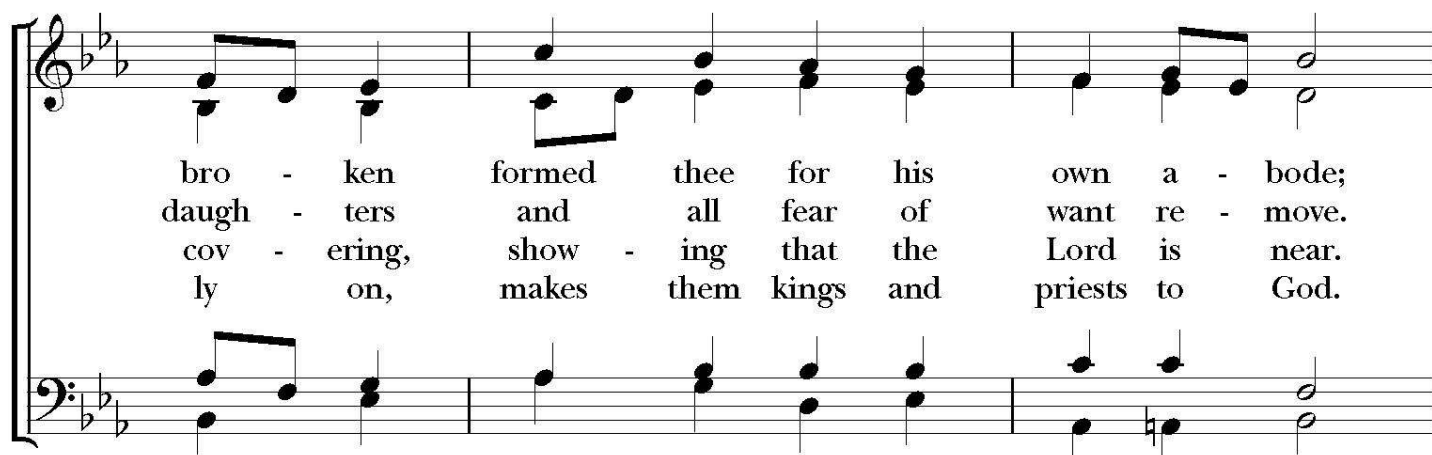

THE FIRST READING Romans 12:1-8

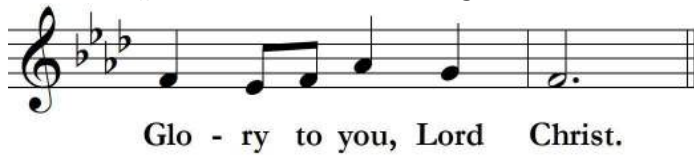
